- 5 This avenue did not extend west of Sheridan Boulevard until the 1930s, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt creates the Works Progress Administration. The roadway was designed as a route to Red Rocks Amphitheatre, also under construction at the time.
- 6 Tibbie Fraser, daughter of Scottish stone mason George Fraser, was the first known child born here.
- 9 Father Paul von Lobkowitz opened this, the second in-patient hospice program in the United States, in 1977 on Everett Court.
- 14 This “unsinkable” person once drove an electric car, and her former summer residence sits at South Wadsworth Boulevard and West Yale Avenue.
- 15 In 1950, a former ordnance plant that operated for less than five years south of Sixth Avenue was renamed this.

- 1 This was Lakewood’s first structure to be placed on the National Register of Historic Places.
- 2 A man who grew up working in this restaurant reportedly told the Rocky Mountain News in 1988 that the diner was “open 365 days a year for 24 hours a day from 1957 to 1974. When we finally closed for a shift, we had to call a locksmith to put locks on the doors.”
- 3 This Sloan’s Lake beach featured a zoo, roller coaster, skating rink and theater before being burned down in 1890 and 1908 fires.
- 4 This elementary school, which opened in 1964, was named after pioneering brothers Valentine and George. Valentine once was Buffalo Bill Cody’s teacher.
- 7 Lakewood’s oldest homeowner association was named after a nearby peak.
- 8 The West Colfax motel is where John Hinckley stayed for a week until he flew to Washington, D.C. to attempt to assassinate President Reagan.
- 10 Sheridan Boulevard, the county line between Jefferson and Denver, was developed as a route to Fort Sheridan, now known by this name
- 11 This mansion near Wadsworth Boulevard and Alameda Avenue was built in the Depression era as a replica of a Marie Antoinette chateau and demolished in 1970.
- 12 Mr. DiPaolo took over this eatery in 1961, with his wife, Jeannene, waiting tables, 9-year-old Judy hostessing and himself in the kitchen while their oldest daughter, Natalie, was at home with baby Teresa.
- 13 The Ladies Aid Society of the Lakewood Community Church opened Lakewood’s first one of these in 1937.
